REMOTE AREA MEDICAL

We have been blessed to work with our dear friends at Remote Area Medical (RAM) for several years. We try to go with them when they do Health Clinics in the rural Appalachian Communities that we serve. We contribute hygiene items (toothbrushes, toothpastes, bars of soap, shampoos) and pack hygiene bags to distribute to the patients as they leave a healthcare event. We also try to help with donations to cover some of their event expenses and equipment costs.

At a recent RAM Clinic in Oneida, TN, around 700 patients were treated. Many of them had very serious and urgent healthcare needs. For most of those who came seeking medical help just getting there was a major challenge. Many were in serious pain but made the journey just hoping they would receive treatment and care.
