MOH SCHOLAR BRINGS A MESSAGE OF HOPE

Summer Botts has a captivating story after being selected as a MOH scholar three years ago. This competent 21-year-old will graduate cum laude from Tennessee Tech University this coming December. Her accomplishments include graduating in three years, making the Dean's List every semester and being the First-generation college student in her family. Summer's plan after graduation is to earn a master's degree in social work from the University of Tennessee and enter that field to work with abused children.

The Mission of Hope is not a stranger to Summer. It has been a part of her life since elementary school. Volunteers brought school supplies, clothes and Christmas gifts to the children in her rural Elk

Valley community in Scott County. She recently told the Farragut Rotary Club, "Yes, I've known about the Mission of Hope for a long time and it has been a part of my life for a long time. It opened the door to me for college and for what my life will be. The Mission of Hope believed in me more than I believed in myself."

The Mission of Hope scholarship, combined with the Tennessee HOPE scholarship, has allowed Summer to attend college and earn a degree in sociology. "If you could see where I came from to where I am today you'd know why this is all so special to me," she added. Ray Fisher stated that the aim of the Mission of Hope is to break the cycle of poverty "One student at a time." Summer's mentor Shawna Dittrich described Summer as being, "Very independent, self-motivated and self-disciplined."

May God continue to bless the Mission of Hope as it continues to award scholarships to students who have the desire to pursue a college education.

HOPE ACADEMY

This year's Hope Academy team included volunteers from First Presbyterian church of Greenback, Jack and Ann Salyers from Lexington and the team from Christ Covenant Presbyterian Church. These volunteers conducted a children's program and a teen program at the same time as the adult classes were being held. Extreme Couponing was a first-time class taught by a couple of parents from Black Mountain. This group planned a visit to local stores to learn how to use the coupons.

The attendance at Hope Academy averaged 80 people each night and served a total of 40 family units during the Hope Store. A total of 18 classes were held which included- quilting, lesser known Bible stories, how to decorate with mason jars, medical questions answered, gardening, and homemade cleaners. A photographer came to take pictures of families and then gave each family their picture. A nurse checked blood pressures and counsel folks with high readings. Team members enjoyed spending time with their friends of the mountains and extending the Hope of Jesus to all!

This was the last Hope Academy at Black Mountain, but Ginger Forbes and her volunteers plan to come up with some different ideas to be involved with the school on a regular basis. A quilting group lead by Donna Fraley is now emailing each other on a regular basis.
